### Yornaning Dam

Yornaning Dam is the ideal place for a picnic or BBQ. Take a walk through the surrounding nature reserve and watch for the many birds in the area. BBQs, picnic tables, toilets and playground facilities.

### Popanyinning - 'Hard to Say, Nice to Stay'



The town was originally named Popaning, an Aboriginal word for waterhole. Call in for a friendly chat at the Popanyinning Store or stay overnight at Laze-away Caravan Park, on the banks of the Hotham River.

### Hotham Olives

### Dryandra Woodland

Dryandra Woodland is one of the best places in the South West for viewing native wildlife. Watch for kangaroos, wallabies, echidnas and the elusive numbat.



### Barna Mia

Nestled in Dryandra Woodland is Barna Mia, a sanctuary for endangered animals. Take a guided nocturnal tour through Barna Mia and discover a number of endangered animals including bilbies, wallabies, bandicoots and woylies.

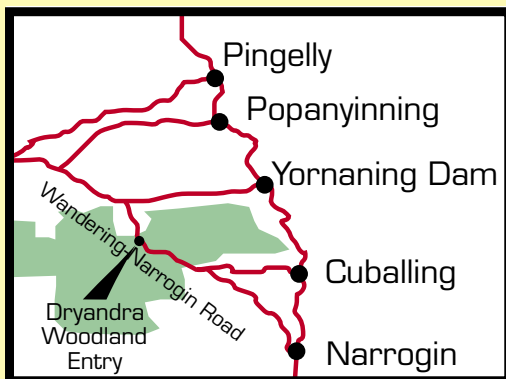

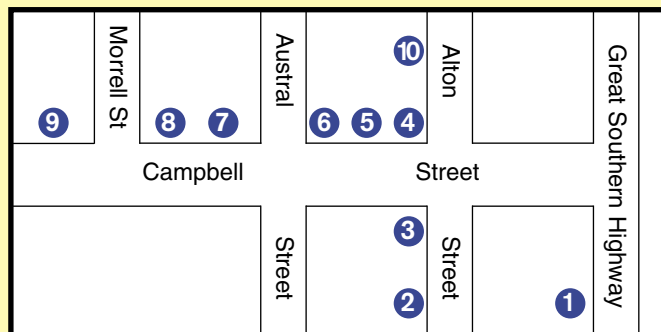

# Heritage Buildings

Cuballing has a number of heritage buildings, which have been lovingly restored.



**1 Railway Cottage**  
Built in 1905 to house the Station Master, this cottage is the last remaining component of the old Cuballing Railway Station precinct.



**2 Cuballing Tavern**  
Built in 1892, the Cuballing Tavern has recently been restored to reflect its original design. Call in for a cold drink or try the wood fired pizzas!



**3 Western Australian Bank**  
Built at the turn of the century, this building served as a bank for many years. Later the building was used as a deli and is now a private residence.



**4 Cuballing Post Office**  
Local resident, Helen Elliott is currently restoring the Post Office and gardens. Visitors are welcome and the building can be hired as a small exhibition space. For enquiries please call 9883 6090.



**5 Agricultural Hall**  
The Hall was built in 1912 and cost 890 pounds. The Hall has been granted heritage status and is currently used for local functions and events.



**6 Cuballing CWA Hall**  
This building was the original Roads Board office and served as the Cuballing Shire Council Office. In 1980 the Hall was re-opened as the Cuballing CWA Hall.



**7 St Peter's Church**  
St Peter's Church was built in 1911 and is an excellent example of an early Gothic style church. The Church is now a private residence.



**8 Ingersley Homestead**  
Built in 1914, this homestead reflects the Australian colonial style of architecture. The owners are now in the process of restoring the homestead.



**9 Dungog Homestead**  
Thomas Reynolds, an early entrepreneur in Cuballing, built this stately home in 1904. The west wing was a ballroom complex used to entertain state dignitaries.



**10 Uniting Church**  
Built in 1904, the Church recently celebrated its 100th birthday. The Uniting Church currently runs church services every Sunday.
